Sandbank Community Action Plan 2014-2019

The community of Sandbank has reviewed and updated their Community Action Pan to ensure that this, the third edition, truly reflects the ambitions of Sandbank Today.

During the review of the previous plan it was identified that the following achievements have been made:

- The construction of a new playground for the young people of Sandbank
- Researched and designed new signage and entrances to the community
- Developed local information leaflets and interpretation on local heritage

It was identified that a number of priorities remained current whilst views have changed on areas that were once a priority, such as the Marina development. Also, specific areas, such as amenities for children and young people, required further investigation during the formation of this new plan.

The Plan summarises community views on:

- Sandbank now
- the vision for its future
- the issues that matter most
- priorities for action

The Plan belongs to the community as a whole and makes a clear statement about the type of place Sandbank aims to be and what needs to be done to get there.





Local people have their say

The Sandbank Community Action Plan Steering Group, which included members of the community development trust and community council as well as independent members of the community, conducted a detailed review of the previous action plan and identified that a significant proportion of the plan remained valid and that the most appropriate course of action at this stage would be to update the current plan in consultation with the wider population whilst not losing sight of the work carried out to further the actions previously identified.

The previous (2008 – 2011) Action Plan was informed by extensive community engagement which included stakeholder meetings, community surveys and a community open day.

During the development of this Updated Action Plan a further community open day was held to which over 100 people attended. In addition to this a survey targeted at young people in primary education was carried out along with an art competition, the results of which can be seen throughout this document.

42 Community views survey forms were returned from age 10 to 12 school pupils

9 Stakeholder meetings and interviews were held with local groups, businesses, and support organisations

120 People attended the community event

Our Community Now

The information within this section provides a snapshot of Sandbank today and the changes which the community has seen since the previous action plan was produced in 2008.

The Area

Sandbank is a village located on the southern shores of the Holy Loch on the Cowal Peninsula in Argyll. It is a short ferry ride across the Clyde from Greenock and Gourock but feels like a long way from the bustle of the Scottish Central Belt. It is on the edge of the Loch Lomond & The Trossachs National Park and is the village gateway for most of the visitors coming by ferry to the Park and to enjoy the lochs, gardens and forests of the Peninsula.



Population

The population of Sandbank is now around 1250, based on local estimates. It was as high as 1700 in the 1991 Census but over 600 of those were temporary residents here from the United States Navy. The population is skewed slightly towards the elderly with 7% more than the national average and there is a forecast of reducing numbers of primary school children over the next few years.



Housing

There was a boom in housing development in Sandbank at the beginning of the action Plan but the economic downturn has seen slowing if not a halt in housing in Sandbank. The housing stock is presently about 600 slightly more than at the start of the last plan. However there are many houses for sale. There are developments with planning



permission which have not yet been built and there is a recent application for a retirement development behind Hafton House but it is in the early stages.

Employment & The Local Economy

Sandbank is home to an Industrial Estate which is the base for many businesses in the wider Dunoon area however the number of business in this park have reduced over recent years. Some people come into Sandbank to work. In total it is estimated that there are around 60 businesses trading in Sandbank. The previous Action Plan had an optimistic view of



the development of the Marina. Unfortunately it has been affected by the economic downturn and has not developed as anticipated. Fortunately the shop has been resurrected and the Post Office has now reopened.

Our Community Now

Education



The Primary School in Sandbank continues with its roll currently 125. There is also an active Gaelic unit of 53 and a pre school unit of approximately 20. It has been recently upgraded following storm damage in early 2012. Older

students attend Dunoon Grammar School. The roll size would appear to be relatively constant. There is also the opportunity for local access to further education with University of the Highlands and Islands accredited courses being offered through the Dunoon Learning Centre (Argyll College).

Health

Residents are served by either the Riverbank Practice at Kilmun or one of the 3 Practices in Dunoon. There are dental services in Dunoon. Dunoon Hospital is located approximately 3 miles south of Sandbank and provides Accident and Emergency Services.



Social and Community Services and Facilities



Sandbank has both a thriving village hall and Church hall that are used extensively by the community. The Play park has been upgraded as a joint project between the Trust and Argyll and Bute Council. The Broxwood Picnic area is in need of redevelopment.

Leisure and recreation

Organisations and activities include:

- The Holy Loch Sailing Club
- Upper Cowal Bowling Club
- Ardnadam Farm riding tuition
- The Hunters Quay Holiday complex - swimming pool, fitness centre and offers other opportunities such as



■ Freshwater and sea fishing (The Dunoon and District Angling Club publishes information for fishermen).

In addition to this the Trust has built a Bird Hide at Broxwood and is in the process of designating the area round it as a Local Nature Reserve.

Infrastructure

Mains gas is available in Sandbank but not at Sandhaven. Scottish Water have recently upgraded local sewage systems with a new pumping station and facility at Ardnadam Car Park.

Emergency Services

Local Police and Fire Stations are nearby in Dunoon.

Environment



Sandbank is close to some beautiful lochs, gardens and forest as well as having its own Holy Loch coastline to explore. There are a number of paths and trails with the most well-known being the Ardnadam Heritage Trail which leads up to the 'Camels Hump' hill where there are fantastic views over the Firth of Clyde. There has been recent interest in developing a Hydro scheme for the community of Sandbank. There is local concern regarding the condition of the proposed marina site whose development has stalled.

Heritage


Sandbank has a fascinating history linked to its coastal location This has seen it used as a quarantine station; its' local mills providing a



hub for the manufacture of gunpowder; as a centre for the building of world class yachts; and up until the early 1990s one of the communities that housed the American military. Recently new signage and interpretation has been developed which highlights the local Heritage for locals and visitors alike.

Community Views Survey

This was backed up through the recent open day consultation where the following comments were <mark>recorded. A</mark>s part of this update young people were targeted for their opinions on what was important to them about Sandbank. They told us that they liked:

The views and place 30%


Friends 25%

Community Views Survey

During the 2008 consultation the community identified the areas outlined below as needing attention.



This was added to through the recent open day consultation where the following comments were recorded:

What People Said

Village Enhancement:' We need to clear up the Marina Site- It is an eyesore and lets the Village down badly.'; 'We need more litter bins'; 'Knock down the old Primary School'; 'When is someone going to do something about the Marina'; Renovate the old Primary School';

Open Spaces and Environment: 'Clean up the Marina site'; 'We need more paths through the countryside'; 'Finish the Marina ASAP';

Things for young people to do: 'We need a Chippy'; 'We need a football pitch'; 'We need more things to do'.

Pavements and Paths: 'We need proper pavements along the Shore Road to Hunters Quay'; 'Make a path along the hill behind Sandbank'.

Heritage: We need to show off the Boat Building Heritage of Sandbank.'; 'Make a Village trail with Information boards.

As part of this update young people were targeted for their opinions on what was important to them about Sandbank. They told us that they would like:

More things to do 30%

More flowers and plants 12%

No litter 12% Chip Shop 12%

Zoo/Bird garden 10%

Café (by the play area) 10% Skate Park 6%



Sandbank: Our vision for the future

Our vision is of a community which is:

a coastal village with good access to the National Park

Sandbank will make the most of its coastal location at the edge of the National Park. It will continue to develop its marine based activities and seafront. It will develop coastal paths, a local nature reserve at Broxwood, community parks and play areas along the coast and create good walking, cycling and water based access into the National Park. It will develop renewable energy by using local hydro based resources.

an attractive well-kept and safe village

Sandbank itself will be an attractive, well-kept and safe village with a village centre offering a range of services, hospitality, and attractive open space. Village gateways, traffic calming and improved roads and pavements will contribute to the village environment and personal safety.

a strong sense of place and its past

With interpretation and development of our local heritage will have contributed to Sandbank's 'sense of place' and with a good range of activities for all its residents - both young and old.

Ardnam Community Park is an area for development to help support the needs of all ages within the community. We will work towards securing the resources to develop this area.

As a coastal community on the boundary of the National Park, Sandbank is perfectly placed to develop it's outdoor recreation offering. With proposals to develop a Nature Reserve and path and access routes, as well as the variety of water related activities available, the community will work to develop the range of



shops and amenities to support the needs of both locals and visitors.

We will also work with partners to provide opportunities for local businesses to start up, grow and flourish in the area.

Harnessing the power of our local environment will be a key priority for the community. We will do this through the development of a community hydro scheme.

Theme 4: Heritage and Recreation



Sandbank has a fascinating history linked to its coastal location. The community would like to develop a series of events and activities that celebrate the heritage of the area. Improvements in the areas signage and heritage interpretation will be developed to highlight the wealth of interest the area has at it's heart.



Develop a guide to heritage sites including Clachan gunpowder production; wartime activities and camps; post war naval shipyards; quarantine station; ancient settlements Kilmun and Sandbank; whisky production; barrel making; farrier/blacksmith; Waddel's and other ferries.

A calender of events will be produced to reinforce the history of the area.

Where community buildings are demolished, the community will look at opportunities to develop the sites for community use.
